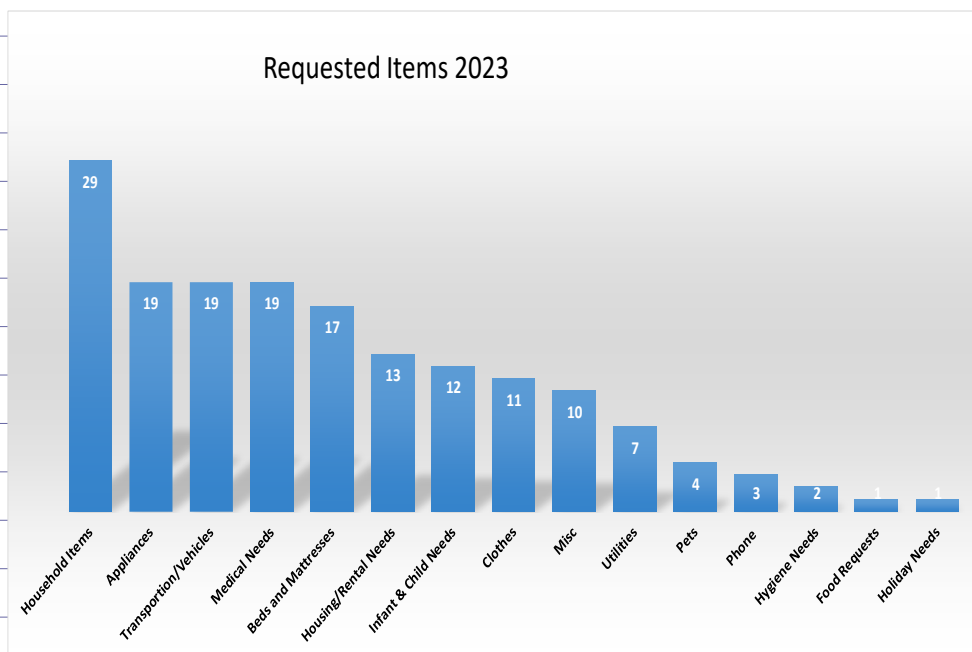
HOLIDAY needs.

NEON has a mission to create a healthier Eastern Oregon. We do this by reducing barriers for both residents and the regional systems that support their health.

Eastern Oregon University Head Start is a free preschool in La Grande Oregon and the surrounding Eastern Oregon Region for income-eligible children aged 3 & 4 and children with disabilities.

Department of Human Services has a mission: to help Oregonians in their own communities achieve well-being and independence through opportunities that protect, empower, respect choice and preserve dignity.

Center for Human Development is a not-for-profit health organization that provides addictions and mental health services, developmental disabilities services, public health services, and veterans services to the residents of Union County.



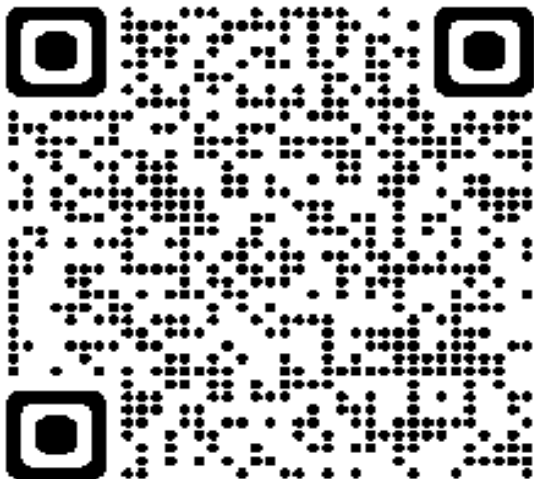
Oregon ONE Mobile App from Oregon DHS

Feel free to download the new Oregon ONE Mobile app from Oregon DHS

You can use the free app to:

- Create a ONE Online account.
- Access their existing ONE Online account.
- Report changes to household information including address, contact information and income.
- Upload requested documents using a smartphone camera.
- Get updates on application status and check if it is approved, denied, or pending, and what actions might need to be taken.
- See and download notices that were mailed.
- Find the next renewal date for their benefits.
- Get important, time-sensitive alerts and notifications about benefits on mobile devices.
- View benefit issuance history for food and cash payments.
